

TROOP 91-RESURRECTION CAMPING POLICY

1. Scouts are encouraged to attend two troop 91 meetings preceding the camp-out in order to plan properly. If a scout is unable to attend a campout, he should notify his patrol leader as soon as possible.
2. Adequate supervision is necessary. Troop 91 must have at least two adults in attendance at every camp-out.
3. Every effort will be made to have at least one adult at the campsite at all times.
4. Scouts will be expected to follow instructions concerning camp set-up, activities, meals, free time, and breaking camp. Scouts must have permission from an adult before leaving the campsite and scouts must follow the buddy system if they go anywhere.
5. Any unusual circumstances such as sickness, etc., must be reported to the scoutmaster, or other person in charge, immediately.
6. Upon arrival at the campsite, specific camping rules will be discussed and agreed to by all scouts on the camp-out.
7. All scouts are expected to load the equipment at the scout garage, take down camp, and unload the equipment at the scout garage after camping.
8. No scout should be in any unsupervised campsite.
9. No fires will be lit and no scout will be allowed in the axe yard without proper adult supervision present.
10. Scout activity policies will apply to all camp-outs with regard to misbehavior and subsequent consequences.
11. In case of emergency or if a scout needs to be picked up early for any reason, parents can contact the scoutmaster's home or committee chairperson's home for directions to the campsite and/or make arrangements to contact troop 91 at the campsite. Adult leaders will check-in with the designated adults at least once a day during camp-outs other than summer camp, if necessary.
12. Money to cover camp-out meals will be automatically deducted from scout accounts after the camp-outs when each scout's share has been determined. If a scout does not show up at a camp-out after signing up and has failed to notify his patrol leader, the meals will be deducted from his scout account. Patrols will stick to a budget for each meal.
13. The patrol grubmaster will purchase the food for the assigned meals, with help of a parent, and provide a cooler for the items needing refrigeration. It is hoped that the grubmaster's family will buy back any food unable to be stored in the patrol boxes, and deduct that money from the total owed them. Within two scout meetings after the camp-out, the grubmaster will provide receipts to

the troop 91 treasurer(or scoutmaster, if treasurer absent) for reimbursement of that amount into the scouts account. If receipts are not turned within 2 scout activities after a camp-out, the scout will not be reimbursed.

14. Patrols will use the patrol method to provide adequate transportation to and from the camp-outs.

15. Scouts will be prepared to for the weather with sufficient warm clothes, boots, gloves, coat, sleeping bag, etc., or the scout will not be allowed to attend.

16. No radios, televisions, or boom boxes are allowed on camp-outs. Personal mp3 players or I-pods, etc., will be allowed for personal use only in that scouts tent. An adult leader may confiscate the item for the duration of the camp-out if it becomes distracting to that scout or other scouts.

17. No pop, candy, or junk food will be allowed on camp-outs, except with a designated sack lunch. Any such items may be confiscated, if necessary. Healthy snacks will be provided, whenever possible.

18. Foul language or swearing is prohibited on all camp-outs and may result in the assignment of undesirable tasks, such as latrine duty, at the discretion of the scout leaders. If bad language continues, then parents will be notified to pick up their scout.

19. Certain special events such as high adventure trips may have additional guidelines established.

20. All Boy Scout of America(BSA) policies and procedures, as listed in the scout activity policy, will be observed as they apply to camping situations.

21. If a scout is injured in any way that affects his ability to participate in any activity on the camp out, an adult leader will contact the scout's parents. The parents and leaders will then decide on proper course of action- ie: pick up scout, further medical attention, etc.

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
